Pastor Ben's Call to Ministry - Part 2

Dear Friends,

In last month's Lectern, I told you about the first of the three personal stages, that I went through in my call to ministry. The second stage of my call to ministry came three years later when I graduated from Teacher Training College and the "Ghana Education Service" placed me in a teaching job in a rural area. I was appointed a confirmed Local Preacher for the Methodist Church in my area. In the Methodist Church of Ghana, a Local Preacher was a Lay Person who was allowed to preach from the pulpit. A Local Preacher for the Methodist Church is a prominent figure in the church's evangelistic efforts both within the church and the surrounding community. Some of the roles that I played in this capacity were: Bible Study Group Leader, Devotional Leader, and member of the Outreach Group. I participated in all of this - and more - for a period of three years. And I must say that those three years helped me to gain a lot of experience which would later become the tools that I used both in Liberia and now in Akrampa. I was very blessed to have the Methodist Church of Ghana choose me as a sponsored candidate to go to Seminary School. Three years of Seminary School led me into the third stage of my calling.

Stage three of my calling to be a Worker in God's Vineyard began upon graduation from Seminary. After graduation I started my ministerial work as a Deacon (Probationer, as it was then called) for three more years. Then in August of 1988, I finally became an Ordained Minister. Shortly after that I joined the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Liberia as a missionary teacher. I worked with them until civil war broke out in Liberia in 1990.
